DISTRICT ADMINISTRATOR MESSAGE

We have just completed a very successful first semester of school. So many great things happen in such a short time. We have been able to watch our students grow. We have watched them work through challenges and grow from them. We have seen many successes in the classroom and in extracurricular activities. As a district, we take pride in being able to offer our students many opportunities to learn and grow. As we offer more for students, we continuously face one challenge and that is the current state of our facilities.

In January, the Board of Education adopted a question for a capital improvement referendum that will appear on the April 4, 2023 ballot. Starting in early fall, community members from throughout the district came to multiple engagement sessions to discuss the current status of the district facilities. In all, there were seven meetings. Community members heard from HSR Architects and Kraemer Brothers Construction on the status of our facilities. The community members were then tasked with a challenge of coming up with a plan that makes sense for the district. After hearing a significant amount of information on the facilities and begin told that the updates that were needed were significant, the community brought a plan to the board in December recommending that the board look at a PK-12 facility with a budget of \$19.5 million dollars. This process was one that allowed for community members to ask questions, provide feedback, and make decisions that they felt made the most sense. At times, there were up to 60 community members providing feedback. During this time, students and staff were also participating in discussion related to facilities. All of the feedback from these groups was provided to the board prior to the vote on a auestion.

There are several opportunities that are coming up that will allow for community members to tour facilities and ask questions. The next opportunity is March 7 from 6-8 pm. There is also an opportunity on March 25 from 9-11 am. During these times, both buildings will be open for tours and there will be round table discussions for individuals to ask questions. The board and administrative team have been participating in informational sessions at local governmental and community meetings. Voters will be asked to make a decision on a plan that places all students in the current MS/HS facility. The plan will create a PK-12 building at that location by adding classroom and gymnasium space to the current building and remodeling and improving the current facilities. The elementary school would be removed due to the costs of updates in that facility. The cost of the project is \$19.5 million. The scope of the work included in the project is updating the mechanical system and building infrastructure, roof replacement at the Jr./Sr. High, safety and security, ADA compliance, and site enhancements to improve traffic flow and student safety.

The District has been diligent in managing expenses and remaining fiscally responsible for taxpayers. Over the last few years, the District has been spending an increasing amount of operational funds to maintain our antiquated systems. In order to update the systems and facilities and make other improvements to educational spaces, a referendum is needed. The maximum tax impact for this referendum is \$3.57 per \$1,000 of valuation. More information on tax impacts for both residential and agricultural entities can be found on the district website. Information on the historical mill rate for the District can also be found on the webpage.

The District has been asked why now. The answer to that is simple, the facilities have outlived their expectancy. While the District has done an outstanding job maintaining equipment, much of which is original to the buildings, the time has come to replace things. There are simply things that do not work and do not meet current standards for compliance and code. This referendum will meet the current and future needs of the students and the community as a whole. The District has adopted the motto of One School, One Community, Our Future to depict this referendum. The future plan that has been created will take the District into the future, providing educational opportunities and experiences for our current Falcons and our future Falcons. Please do your part and become informed so that you can go to the polls on April 4 and make the decision that is best for you.

JHE students continue to work on the school-wide expectation entitled the Falcon Way. Students focus on being respectful, responsible, and safe. 5th Grade Classroom



We have been learning about many exciting things in fifth grade so far this year! Throughout each school day, our fifth graders have a chance to earn Falcon Tickets by showing expected behavior and by following the Falcon Way by being respectful, responsible, and safe. Our fifth graders have also had the opportunity to be a part of Safety Patrol. Safety Patrol consists of a few different roles including door duty, lunch room help, flag duty, and bus or pick up duty. Every two weeks our students are assigned a new role. Our fifth graders look forward to helping out in our school by making sure students who are walking through the halls are going where they need to be and guiding them to the right direction to make sure they leave school safely.

In Reading, as a class we have been learning more about poetry and together have read the novels The Night of the Twisters and Rascal. The students enjoyed reading these books and have been working on making predictions, connections, and sharing those ideas with others in small groups.

Throughout Writing we learned more about personal narratives and just finished our unit on research reports. The students came up with some good information on topics they chose to research. They were able to put together a slideshow on their topic with the information they have gathered. We were very excited to see how these all turned out! Now we are working through our memoir unit. We also began our new handwriting unit learning how to write in cursive. The students have been doing so well with this.

In Math at the beginning of the school year we worked on learning more about multiplying and dividing fractions. We then moved onto learning how to add, subtract, multiply and round decimals with whole numbers. We will soon work on how to divide decimals and continue to learn more about operations and word problems, coordinate graphs and geometry.

In Science we took a look at learning more about ecosystems and the food web and we just completed our unit on water cycles and earth systems. We are excited to begin our new unit on stars and the solar system. Throughout Social Studies we have been talking about the first Americans, the age of exploration and the colonies that settled in North America.

Together as a class we have learned so much already. We can't believe we are halfway through the school year, but we will continue to have fun learning many more things throughout fifth grade!



4K News



The 4K class has been very busy this past quarter, it seems that each day there is someone that shows me something new they can do. I love hearing about and seeing all their growth and the new things they've learned! The exciting and special thing about 4K is that the students are so eager to experience and try new things.

4K learned about many of the different holidays that are celebrated during this time of the year. In November, the students learned more about Veteran's Day and Thanksgiving. We focused quite a bit of our discussions how on being thankful and how we can show our thanks to people in our classroom, school, community, and families. We were very thankful to get together with our 2nd grade reading buddies to make edible ornaments for the Hustisford Memorial Park tree. The students in both classes love the time they spend together no matter what the activity is!

We had a gingerbread unit and made some gingerbread-scented play dough. The kids loved all the spices and playing with the dough in our cookie center. During December the students learned about a lot of different holidays that are celebrated around the world. The holidays we read about were St. Nicholas Day, St. Lucia Day, Kwanzaa, Hanukkah, and Christmas. They were able to make crafts and food that are traditionally made or served during those holidays. They especially enjoyed having cinnamon rolls on St. Lucia Day and trying potato latkes for Hanukkah! They practiced their fine motor skills when they wrapped presents in the holiday center to put under our tree or "deliver" to their classmates. In the discovery center, students learned how to use the scale and compare the weights of various winter items.

When we returned from winter break, we changed the way they write their names. Since the beginning of the school year, they've been learning to write their names using all capital letters because we follow the Learning Without Tears writing curriculum. This month, students started to write their names "the kindergarten way," with only their first letter

being uppercase and the rest being lowercase. The students have been working hard at this transition and their progress reflects it! They are very excited about this new way of writing!



Check Out What's Happening in Third Grade

It has been a busy and fun first half of third grade! We are learning so much and having a lot of fun along the way. Third graders are learning to be role models by following the Falcon Way each day. They strive to show respect, responsibility, and that they are safe. They enjoy earning Falcon tickets for showing expected school and classroom behavior.



In math we have been learning so many new concepts while reviewing some old ones. In third grade, we focus on learning multiplication and division facts and then apply them to story problems and other concepts. We also reviewed addition and subtraction with regrouping. We are starting to learn about factions, measuring, and telling time before and after the hour.

In third grade reading, we spend a lot of time focusing on comprehending what we are reading. We have read several novels as a class to build our comprehension skills. We have read *Stone Fox*, *Charlotte's Web*, and *Because of Winn Dixie*. Each book led us to falling in love with different characters and joining them on their adventures.

In writing we have written personal narratives; short stories about one time in our lives. We spent time zooming in to this moment to include details, dialogue, and important people. We just finished our informational writing unit where we became experts on a topic in order to write a book to teach others. We spent time researching, planning, drafting, revising, and publishing throughout the unit. We just started learning about opinion writing and can't wait to share our opinions with others or to take a stance on a topic of our choice.

Science and social studies have been a lot of fun. In social studies we have been learning about the environment, communities, and government. We will continue to learn more about these as the rest of the year. In science we learned about animals through time and invisible forces. We enjoyed doing different hands-on activities and explorations to learn what animals in the past might have looked and how different invisible forces such as magnets, gravity, and push and pull forces work.

In third grade we also spend time learning how to properly print letters so we can write in cursive. We began our year by learning how to properly print letters. Now we are learning how to properly form our cursive letters.

Third graders have learned so much already this year. I can't wait to see what they continue to learn and do this year!



Let's Read and Keep on Reading

As we come to an end of our 1st semester, many of our students have engaged in learning how to read and working on building their reading stamina. But what is reading stamina and how can a parent help their child increase their time spent reading?

Reading stamina is a child's ability to focus and read independently for long-ish periods of time without being distracted. This stamina, or endurance, builds strength. In this case, strength in reading and their reading skills.



The question is, *"How can I help my child build their stamina and engage in reading?"* Here are a few tips:

- **Change it Up!** Vary the way reading is done. The child can "read to themselves, read to someone or something (stuffy or pet), and listen to reading." Some combination of the three should make up the reading time, especially with young or struggling readers. Make it Fun!!
- **Just Right Books** This could mean something different for each reader. It could be a favorite genre or type of book (example: graphic novels, fiction, non-fiction, I-spy) anything that sparks their interest and would help with engagement. If your child is at a stage of being able to read alone, help them choose books that they can read independently. If you are reading to your child (which I Highly recommend at any age) find books that may be at a higher level to promote a higher level of vocabulary and engagement in increasing background knowledge.
- **Book Talk** Engagement in your child's reading is key! Talk and ask questions about what they read. Start with simple questions: What happened? Was there a problem? What was your favorite part? Or How did it end? From there you can start higher level questioning and making predictions or asking if they can make a connection to other things. Your engagement allows your child to see that you are interested in what they are reading and in turn, gives them a reason to read.
- **Celebrate Progress** Without getting too caught up on the number of minutes spent reading, celebrate the time that is spent reading!!
- **Read by example** Allow the children to see that you too find reading entertaining, engaging and educating.

Hope you all have an Amazing time reading and engaging in your child's reading adventures!!

Greetings Hustisford Jr. / Sr. High School Families, It seems very strange to say the school year is half over. This has been a great year so far and I look forward to what the rest of the year brings. In no time the Seniors will be walking across the stage receiving their diplomas. The second semester always seems to go faster than a blink of an eye. In the next coming months there will be a career fair, concerts, award recognition ceremonies, field trips, competitions, banquets, tournaments and playoffs. I look forward to seeing our students continue to excel and grow as young adults.

The mandated testing season will soon begin. The ACT testing for the 11th grade will take place on Tuesday, March 7th. On Tuesday, March 7th Grades 6 - 10 and grade 12 will <u>not</u> have school. The ACT is now administered on a digital format that does require the school district's wireless infrastructure and the 1Gb internet connection. This test has strict administration guidelines that require the school day to be used for this test alone. This test is a very important piece for your child's future plans. We look forward to seeing their success on the test. This event at the Jr. / Sr. High School will not impact JHE in any way. JHE will run as a normal school day. We greatly appreciate your cooperation and understanding.

The 10th graders as well as grades 6 - 8 will be taking the Forward Exam March 21st - April 24th. This year students will be spreading out these assessments over a longer period of time to break up the time students are testing in a given day. Students will focus on one subject matter assessment per testing day.

The PreACT Secure test for 9th grade will take place on Tuesday, March 21st and for 10th grade on Wednesday, March 22nd. PreACT Secure is a summative assessment given to 9th and 10th grade students, that is aligned to the ACT and the ACT College and Career Readiness Standards. PreACT Secure measures what students have learned in the areas of English, Reading, Mathematics, and Science.

Falcon Future Talks

Once a month, during Falcon Time, Sr. High students participate in Falcon Future talks for an Academic and Career Planning lesson. Generous individuals from a wide array of career fields donate their time to come in to speak to our students about their field. Students are given four choices each time to select one area they would like to learn more about for a possible career path. Students are given information about what it takes to enter that field or position and have the ability to ask questions. Students have had the opportunity to learn about the following careers so far: Hustisford State Bank, Navigation Wealth Management, Rolair, Military service, John Deere, several Dodge County offices, LKQ, Hustisford Police Department, WE Energies Agriculture services, Building and Trades Commission, Wondra Construction, Roeselor Flooring, Natalie Jean Esthetics LLC, Kraemer Brothers Construction, Kettle Moraine Veterinary Clinic, Department of Corrections, and Physical Therapist positions.
