From the Desk of Mrs. Cramer, District Administrator

Our students have been working hard this year and are on the homestretch of the 2023-2024 school year. Our 4K students who entered in the fall are now more confident and they are ready for their next adventures in 5K. Our 5th grade students are preparing to leave the halls of JHE and move to the Jr./Sr. High to begin their new adventures. Finally, the Class of 2024 is ready to turn the page to the next chapter of their lives. We are so excited to see where they go and what they achieve. No matter where they go, they are always a Hustisford Falcon! Congratulations to the Class of 2024!

Earlier this month, residents were asked to vote on a referendum question for facility updates. This question addressed critical needs for the buildings, HVAC and roof. Unfortunately, the referendum was voted down. The Hustisford School Board will continue to look for solutions to the building needs. The board will work diligently to come up with solutions that are feasible for the district and tax payers. What will be done and how it will be accomplished will be discussed at upcoming board meetings. While the needs are not going away, the determination to find a solution will not go away either. The district will look to make repairs and replacements as the budget allows. This past year the district installed two new boilers at the Jr./Sr. High. The district has and will continue to maintain all operations within the buildings. Working together, we will find a solution.

Fundraising efforts are underway to replace the playground at JHE. There have been numerous small fundraising opportunities that have been done. To date, just over \$11,000 has been raised for the replacement. The replacement will include a new surface and all new equipment. While the current playground is still functional, it is reaching the end of its life. The total amount that needs to be raised is right around \$300,000.00. A larger campaign for making donations will be coming out soon. We know that this is a big number, but the students are very excited for what the new playground will be. The new playground will be accessible for all students as well. This will provide options for students with mobility issues that we currently do not have. This is an exciting campaign for the district. The fundraising that has been done has been done by John Hustis PTC as well as the JHE Staff.

This time of the year, there are many opportunities to take in activities around the schools. The HD United Girls' Soccer team is in action, the Hustisford Track and Field season is underway, our HD Baseball and Softball teams are hitting the fields, and our trap shooting team is already crushing clay. New to the district this year, we have a 5-8 grade softball team. The music program will be putting on their spring concerts in early May. The Community Dance Program will also be having their annual recital on April 26. Graduation is also just around the corner. Fifth grade graduation is May 22 at 6:00 p.m. and the Class of 2024 will graduate on May 24 at 7:00 p.m.. Please feel free to join us and check out our amazing students! 2024 Trailways Conference Math Meet

On Tuesday, March 5, nineteen MS and HS students traveled to Palmyra-Eagle for the annual Trailways Math Meet. Students competed in four categories depending on their current math class: Algebra 1, Geometry, Algebra 2, and Advanced Math. Students first took an individual test and then worked together on a separate team test. After all the grading was done, all the students in the competition were ranked in each category and a category-specific team score was calculated using both individual scores and the team test score. Finally, an overall school rank was determined using the team scores from the different categories. The Hustisford Algebra and Geometry teams did well on some very tough tests and each team placed 6th overall with several great contributions from team members. Individually, Gryffin Nicholls (Algebra 1) and Koltin Her (Geometry) led their respective teams. The Algebra 2 team placed 3rd overall and were led by Alex Davis placing 11th, Maddy Maas placing 10th and Kiera Leinen placing 5th overall as individuals. The Advanced Math team placed 4th overall and were led by top ten finishers Mason Nicholls in 10th, Colter Sliper in 9th, and Andy Maas in 4th overall as individuals. The great performances by all who took part led to a 5th place finish by the Hustisford Team. Great job everyone! Thank you to all who participated and represented the school well.

This year the Hustisford Middle School celebrated a wonderful opportunity for its students: a Middle School Forensics Team! The purpose of forensics and speech are many. Below are several reasons why a Forensics Team benefits our students.

- •Promote literacy: read, write, speak, and listen
- •Build confidence and social skills through peer support
- •Foster information literacy and research
- •Develop critical thinking skills and logical reasoning
- •Increase social awareness and responsibility
- •Provide outlet for creative expression for both gifted and at-risk youth
- •Conquer stage fright before fear of public speaking can develop
- •Explore topics of personal relevance
- •Extend learning in cross-curricular topics

All of these things promote gains in a pre-teen's academic, cognitive, and social abilities and are so consistent and substantial that we owe it to our young people to train them in forensic Speech activities. Cultivating skills through Speech meets curricular standards for literacy and language arts, and enhances performance on high-stakes, standardized tests "Middle Level Speech programs should build knowledge, confidence and interest in speaking as a lifelong skill."

This year's team grew from two members last year to nine members this year!! Its members included Kendall Anderson, Ellie Buchanan, Clarabelle Gentry, Klaire Her, Serenity Jacobson-Croft, Naomi Jarosinski, Abby Schifelbine, Kiara Tucek and Evelyn Wulf. Child Development

Child Find

The early ages of child development are extremely important. Check out important developmental milestones below and on the next page. Hustisford School District is responsible for identifying children between the ages of 3-21 years that may have a disability. As part of our child find efforts, Hustisford School District sends developmental screening questionnaires (ASQ-3) to families residing in our district with a child between 2.5-4 years old not enrolled at our school. If you received a questionnaire, please complete and return it.

Development 2.5-8 years

Physical

- Can twist items with hands & turns book pages (2.5 yr)
- Takes some clothes off (2.5) and puts some clothes on (3 yr), like loose pants and jacket.
- Jumps off the ground with both feet (2.5 yr)
- Strings items together, like large beads (3 yr)
- Uses a fork (3 yr)

Cognitive

- Uses things to pretend, like feed a doll a block (2.5 yr)
- Shows simple problem-solving skills (2.5 yr)
- Follows two-step instructions, like "Put the toy down and close the door." (2.5 yr)
- Shows they know at least one color (2.5 yr)
- Draws a circle, when shown how (3 yr)
- Avoids touching hot objects when warned (3 yr)

Social-Emotional

- Plays next to other children and sometimes plays with them (2.5 yr)
- Shows you what they can do by saying, "Look at me!" (2.5 yr)
- Calms down within 10 minutes after you leave her (3 yr)
- Notices other children and joins them to play (3 yr)

Development 4-5 years

Physical

- Catches a large ball most of the time (4yr)
- Serves self food and pours water (4yr)
- Unbuttons some buttons (4yr) and buttons some (5yr)
- · Hold crayon/pencil between fingers and thumb (4 yr)
- Hops on one foot (5 yr)

Cognitive

- Names a few colors of items. Tells what comes next in a story. Draws a person with 3 or more parts (4 yr)
- Counts to 10 and names numbers 1-5 (5 yrs)
- Names some letters and writes some in their name (5 yr)
- Pays attention for 5-10 minutes during activities, not including screen time (5 yr)


Social-Emotional

- Pretends to be something else during play (4 yr)
- Asks to go play with children if none are around (4 yr)
- · Comforts others who are hurt or sad (4 yr)
- Likes to be helper (4 yr); Does simple chores at home (5 yr)
- Avoids danger (4 yr)
- Changes behavior based on the place they are (5 yr)
- Follows rules or takes turn when playing games with other kids (5yr)


