


Hustisford Happenings

District Administrator Message





These two areas of need are not it for the district. There are other areas that were addressed last year, but the Board of Education felt that this is a great start to move forward with repairs. The buildings have aged; maintenance has been done. This is evident in the fact that original components are still operating, but there comes a time that replacement becomes necessary.

The District has been working on updates across several areas through the regular operating budget. However, all projects and updates are not possible through our annual operating budget. The District has to prioritize projects in many different areas. The various areas that have been addressed include, but are not limited to curriculum, buildings and grounds, programming, athletics, and staffing. Over the past several years, the District has made a substantial investment in many of these areas. The following information shows some of the highlights of what has been done.

The Hustisford School District has updated several curricular areas to ensure that our students have the most up-to-date materials to enhance learning and achievement. New math curriculum was implemented across all grade levels. New Social

Studies curriculum was also implemented in both schools. New reading and writing is currently being reviewed for adoption in both buildings. High School English classes also updated novels for classes. Science curriculum at both buildings was updated as well. The District has also worked to provide updates in social emotional curriculum at all grade levels. Updates also were completed in the area of foreign language and agriculture. Advanced Placement courses were added in the area of social studies, science, and math along with dual credit and transcripted courses in the areas of math, business, and agriculture. Course options have been added across all curricular areas in middle and high school. Youth apprentice options have been expanded and students also are provided options for taking college credits through Early College Credit programs. Technology has been significantly upgraded throughout the District. Students operate in a 1:1 learning environment. Students in grades PK-2 utilize iPads to enhance instruction while students in grades 3-12 are using Chromebooks. Students and staff utilize Google Classroom which allows staff to post assignments and learning tools for students to utilize outside of the regular classroom setting. The technology upgrades were made possible through grant funding as well as generous community donations. Technology for the classrooms is also being updated. As technology becomes outdated, the district finds ways to ensure that updates and upgrades can be made. The district utilized competitive grant funding for many of these upgrades. The District has also focused on programming to ensure that our students have similar opportunities to those in surrounding districts. The District made the commitment to bring back the agriculture program. This was done several years ago, but it was a commitment that was made to the students to provide more opportunities in the area of agriculture and science. The program continues to grow and offer new opportunities for students through the classroom and the FFA organization. The District also started its own Early Childhood Special Education program. Prior to having this program in-house, our students were sent to a neighboring district for services. Having the program in-house provides an environment for students in their home school and a long-term cost savings for the District. The District also added an Occupational Therapy position. This position is shared with another District. This position was previously filled with contracted services. Again, adding this position into the District provides our students more opportunities for growth and allows us to build our services for students within the buildings. The District refocused the Kid's Club program and is now providing childcare services for any student in 4K following the morning 4K program as well as after-school care for students in grades K-5. The District recently received a grant to help support the development and implementation of a 3-Year-Old program for children. This will provide a low cost, high quality pre-school program for 3-year-old children and also provide an opportunity for expanded childcare services for these children. We are hoping for a Fall of 2024 start date for this program; planning is currently underway.


The District continually reviews the opportunities that students have in regards to extra-curricular activities as well. The District began offering Track and Field for HS students after students indicated an interest. Students have been able to show their success in this sport. The district has made a commitment to allowing for further cooperative programs as well to allow students more options. This spring, our middle school girls will be provided the opportunity to participate in a school sponsored softball team. This opportunity is being provided to help build a program that we have struggled with in the past. The commitment to students and providing all that we can is evident in these crucial board decisions. The Sr. High School provides an alternative program for students that will provide opportunities for growth and academic success. This program will provide more options for our District to help meet the needs of all students.

Additionally, building and grounds maintenance occurs annually. Recently, two new boilers were installed at the Jr./Sr. High. The new boilers, along with digital controls within the boiler room were completed in November. The boilers replaced the one working boiler in the building. The District is in a maintenance agreement for the HVAC system in both buildings to ensure that the systems are running to their full capacity. As units and buildings age, it becomes more challenging to maintain them. Parts and units are obsolete and it is challenging to find replacements for fixes. John Hustis Elementary received a new roof due to damage from a wind storm several years ago. The District updated all locks on both interior and exterior doors through grant funding. This project was over \$75,000. This was done because over time locks fail and keys fail and we were at the point that it was occurring on a regular basis. Along with the new lock installation, there were several doors that were in need of repair. Doors that were showing their age and no longer were functional were replaced at both buildings. The new doors were both interior doors and exterior doors. Parking lot repairs were done at the Jr./Sr. High to help fix a drainage issue around the building and in the parking lot itself. The parking lots are again in

need of repair in several areas. This is an annual maintenance item that the board reviews to ensure that our lots are safe for our students and staff. Flooring has been updated at John Hustis Elementary. All classrooms and hallways have received new tile. There are several areas still in need of new flooring, but a significant investment was made to JHE in regards to floors. The Jr./Sr. High gym received some upgrades as well. The floor had reached its life expectancy and needed to be refinished. This is something that is done to keep the floor in top shape and to prevent more significant damage that could be done if maintenance is not completed. New bleachers were also installed in the gym. The old bleachers posed significant safety risks. The new bleachers are up to code and provide the safety features needed. Updates were made in the kitchen at the Jr./Sr. High as well. Many of the updates were done to bring our surfaces up to code. The Jr./Sr. High had an accessible bathroom built in the commons area. This is not something that was planned for when it occurred, rather the District was mandated to do it. It has enhanced accessibility for our community, students, and staff. Painting has been done in both buildings. The District continues to invest in the buildings. The buildings do show signs of their age and more significant updates still remain. The District will need the support of the community to move forward with several of the projects. As we move forward into the spring semester, there are always summer projects on our minds. We look at ways that our budget can support additional projects throughout the summer. The commitment to the students in the Hustisford School District is evident. The mission statement of the District is to empower all students to learn the skills, acquire the knowledge and develop the attitudes necessary for them to reach their full potential as citizens. The improvements outlined that have been accomplished in the past 9 years show that commitment to our students and the community.

The improvements and updates have been done with help and support from the community and the dedication and vision of many. The support of community members, businesses, and organizations have helped us to expand programs and bring new things to students. Currently, a campaign kicked off to help raise funds for new playground equipment at JHE. This is something that is needed, but is not a high priority in our operating budget. The generosity of the community is something that we appreciate. While these amazing things were being done in the District, budget cuts were being made to ensure that the District is operating a balanced budget. As we all know, things have become more expensive and therefore doing more with less is our reality. We have faced these challenges and met them. The District had to make cuts that were not always popular, but the board ensured that programming for our students was not cut. We have faced challenges, but rather than letting those challenges define us, we have accepted the challenges and worked with them to make ourselves grow and improve. Our students are meeting the challenges of the classroom and in extra-curricular activities.

This fall, JHE was named a top elementary school in Wisconsin. This is based on our high achieving students and the work that they do each day. Again, we have so much to be proud of. The pride within the Hustisford School District is deep, it is evident in the support that is received for students in many areas. The traditions within the District are valued as well. We are #HustyProud!





From your School Board



Hello Community Members!

In mid-January, I had the privilege of representing the Hustisford School District at the WI Association of School Board (WASB) 2024 Delegate Assembly in Milwaukee. As our District's Delegate, my vote represents our Board's will to support (or not support) resolu-

tions that guide the WASB's legislative efforts with state legislators and agencies in policy-making. Decisions from the Delegate Assembly direct the WASB's positions with the statewide education agenda.

Of the 11 resolutions that were considered by the Assembly, a resolution supporting state funding to maintain the Office of School Safety over-



whelmingly passed from the roughly 300 Delegates in attendance. School safety is a top issue for parents across Wisconsin, and funding for the continuation of the Office of School Safety was not included in the state's final 2023-2025 biennial budget. The Office of School Safety functions in supporting grants for schools, training for school staff and law enforcement to prevent and mitigate school violence, and maintaining a 24-hour hotline to confidentially report potential threats. The Hustisford School District utilizes these resources in collaboration with our school resource officer and the Village of Hustisford.

At the Board level, facility repair and replacement planning continues within the District. The Board listened to the voters on both sides of the failed April 2023 referendum. We returned to our Capital Improvement Plan that emerged from multiple community engagement meetings and site assessments. After April 2023, the Board revised its approach and prioritized critical facility projects into two categories: those that could be achieved from within our operating budget; and those that exceed state statute limits in borrowing and require referendum approval from voters.

In the fall of 2023, the District replaced the original boilers at the high school with funds from its operating budget. In April 2024, the District will seek voter approval to support critical facility projects in the amount of \$5,300,000 for replacing the roof on the high school; replacing the original boilers at John Hustis Elementary; and replacing HVAC and

AC systems in both buildings. These are clear, defined projects that will upgrade infrastructure and minimize the expenses associated with constant repairs. In December of 2023, the District saw \$4,000 in savings from the replacement of the boilers at the high school through the Focus on Energy program.

The average mill rate impact for a \$5,300,000 referendum would be \$1.10 according to the Baird Financial Services outlook model. Baird quotes very conservatively at a 5.75% interest rate. As we happily move away from the market volatility and inflation of 2023, this interest rate may be lower by the second quarter of 2024. Among the area school districts, Hustisford carries THE LOWEST mill rate for the last two years according to longitudinal data from the Department of Public Instruction that records property valuation, levies, and tax rates in school districts. With a \$1.10 mill rate impact, the Hustisford School District would continue to carry a lower mill rate than half of other area districts and remain below the average 2024 rate.



The 4K class has been very busy this past quarter, it seems that each day there is someone who shows me something new they can do. 
