Hustisford Happenings

From the Desk of Mrs. Cramer, District Administrator

We have just completed a very successful first semester of school. So many great things happen in such a short time. We have been able to watch our students grow. We have watched them work through challenges and grow from them. We have seen many successes in the classroom and in extracurricular activities. As a district, we take pride in being able to offer our students many opportunities to learn and grow. As we offer more for students, we continuously face the challenge of funding all that is provided.

In January, the Board of Education adopted a question for an operational referendum that will appear on the April 1, 2025 ballot. The referendum is asking to exceed the current revenue limit by \$800,000 per year for three years. Why do we need this extra funding? During the regular board meeting in October, a deficit budget of \$560,258.56 was adopted. The extra funding would help to make our budget whole and provide the opportunity to put funds into fund balance to help with daily operating costs and money flow. The state funding that we receive has not kept up with inflation and our district, like many across the state is facing a financial challenge in balancing a budget. We have made and are making cuts to help with this deficit as well, but cuts alone cannot eliminate the budget shortfalls. The district has worked hard to provide our students with opportunities, but all of these things come with a price. We want to keep our kids competitive and keep our programs here so that we continue to make Hustisford an amazing place to attend school. We are so proud of our graduates and what they have accomplished.

While we understand that there are still maintenance concerns that need to be addressed, we want to first take care of the budget shortfall and then work on the projects that need to be completed. The board has worked diligently to prioritize the projects that need to be completed.

The top three projects, as identified by our current board members are

the boilers at JHE, the air conditioning issues at the HS, and the roof at the HS. All of these projects carry large price tags. While it is not possible to do these all at once, the hope and plan is that as the budget balances out, the board will be able to start working toward these projects. The funds that are sought in the referendum are allowed to be used for these costs once the budget is balanced and fund balance has increased.

The School Board and administration continuously have people ask, what have you done to improve this District. The answer to that is not simple, in fact, it is a long list of what our District has done to prioritize learning, achievement, and growth for all students. The District has been working on updates across several areas through the regular operating budget. However, all projects and updates are not possible through our annual operating budget. The District has to prioritize projects in many different areas. The various areas that have been addressed include but are not limited to curriculum, buildings and grounds, programming, athletics, and staffing. Over the past several years, the District has made a substantial investment in many of these areas. The following information shows some of the highlights of what has been done.

The Hustisford School District has updated several curricular areas to ensure that our students have the most up-to-date materials to enhance learning and achievement. New math curriculum was implemented across all grade levels. New Social Studies curriculum was also implemented in both schools. New reading and writing is currently being reviewed for adoption in both buildings. High School English classes also updated novels for classes. Science curriculum at both buildings was updated as well. The District has also worked to provide updates in social emotional curriculum at all grade levels. Updates also were completed in the area of foreign language and agriculture. Advanced Placement courses were added in the area of social studies, science, and math along with dual credit and transcribed courses in the areas of math, business, science, and agriculture. Course options have been added across all curricular areas in middle and high school. Youth apprentice options have been expanded and students also are provided options for taking college credits through Early College Credit programs. Technology has been significantly upgraded throughout the District. Students operate in a 1:1 learning environment. Students in grades PK-2 utilize iPads to enhance instruction while students in grades 3-12 are using Chromebooks. Students and staff utilize Google Classroom which allows staff to post assignments and learning tools for students to utilize outside of the regular classroom setting. The technology upgrades were made possible through grant funding as well as generous community donations. Technology for the classrooms has also been updated. As technology becomes outdated, the district finds ways to ensure that updates and upgrades can be made. The district utilized competitive grant funding for

many of these upgrades. The District has also focused on programming to ensure that our students have similar opportunities to those in surrounding districts. The District made the commitment to bring back the agriculture program through an operating referendum. This was done several years ago, but it was a commitment that was made to the students to provide more opportunities in the area of agriculture and science. When a new operating referendum failed, the board committed to keeping the program as a part of the annual budget. The program continues to grow and offer new opportunities for students through the classroom and the FFA organization. The District also started its own Early Childhood Special Education program. Prior to having this program in-house, our students were sent to a neighboring district for services. Having the program in-house provides an environment for students in their home school and a long-term cost savings for the District. The District refocused the Kid's Club program and is now providing childcare services for any student in 3K and 4K following the morning 3K and 4K programs as well as after-school care for students in grades K-5. The District received a grant to help support the development and implementation of a 3-Year-Old program for children. This provides a low cost, high quality pre-school program for 3-year-old children and also provide an opportunity for expanded childcare services for these children. The District continually reviews the opportunities that students have in regards to extra-curricular activities as well. The District began offering Track and Field for HS students after students indicated an interest. Students have been able to show their success in this sport. The district has made a commitment to allowing for further cooperative programs as well to allow students more options. This past Spring, our middle school girls were provided the opportunity to participate in a school sponsored softball team. This opportunity is being provided to help build a program that we have struggled with in the past. The commitment to students and providing all that we can is evident in these crucial board decisions. The Sr. high school provides an alternative program for students that will provide opportunities for growth and academic success. This program will provide more options for our District to help meet the needs of all students.

Additionally, building and grounds maintenance occurs annually. Two new boilers were installed at the Jr./Sr. High. The new boilers, along with digital controls within the boiler room were completed in November of 2023. The boilers replaced the one working boiler in the building. The District is in a maintenance agreement for the HVAC system in both buildings to ensure that the systems are running to their full capacity. As units and buildings age, it becomes more challenging to maintain them. Parts and units are obsolete and it is challenging to find replacements for fixes. John Hustis Elementary received a new roof due to damage from a wind storm several

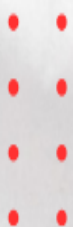

years ago. The District updated all locks on both interior and exterior doors through grant funding. This was done because over time locks fail and keys fail and we were at the point that it was occurring on a regular basis. Along with the new lock installation, there were several doors that were in need of repair. Doors that were showing their age and no longer were functional were replaced at both buildings. The new doors were both interior doors and exterior doors. Parking lot repairs were done at the Jr./Sr. High to help fix a drainage issue around the building and in the parking lot itself. The parking lots are again in need of repair in several areas. This is an annual maintenance item that the board reviews to ensure that our lots are safe for our students and staff. Flooring has been updated in classrooms and hallways at John Hustis Elementary. There are several areas still in need of new flooring, but a significant investment was made to JHE in regards to floors. The Jr./Sr. High gym received some upgrades as well. The floor had reached its life expectancy and needed to be refinished. This is something that is done to keep the floor in top shape and to prevent more significant damage that could be done if maintenance is not completed. New bleachers were also installed in the gym. The old bleachers posed significant safety risks. The new bleachers are up to code and provide the safety features needed. These updates were done by borrowing funds. This loan will be paid off as of June 2025. Updates were made in the kitchen at the Jr./Sr. High as well. Many of the updates were done to bring our surfaces up to code. The Jr./Sr. High had an accessible bathroom built in the commons area. This is not something that was planned for when it occurred, rather the District was mandated to do it. It has enhanced accessibility for our community, students, and staff. Painting has been done in both buildings. The District continues to invest in the buildings. The buildings do show signs of their age and more significant updates still remain.

While we certainly have accomplished a lot through adding new opportunities for our students, we did not simply just add, we made cuts to keep our budget in check as well. Over the past 10 years, the District has decreased staffing in many areas. It is never popular to make cuts, but it is necessary. We have cut 7 support staff, 2.5 administrative positions, and 8 teaching staff. We will continue to make necessary cuts as they are available to make. Cuts cannot always be made. There are many steps that we take to ensure that the cuts being made are sustainable and make sense to our students and budget. Cutting things that have a direct impact on students is always challenging. Cutting programming is also a challenge as we want to offer as much as possible for our kids. If we cut too much, it will impact enrollment and student achievement, two things that we are not willing to compromise.

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The commitment to the students in the Hustisford School District is evident. The mission statement of the District is to empower all students to learn the skills, acquire the knowledge and develop the attitudes necessary for them to reach their full potential as citizens. The improvements outlined that have been accomplished in the past 10 years show that commitment to our students and the community.

The improvements and updates have been done with help and support from the community and the dedication and vision of many. The support of community members, businesses, and organizations have helped us to expand programs and bring new things to students. While these amazing things were being done in the District, budget cuts were being made to ensure that the District is operating as efficiently as possible. As we all know, things have become more expensive and therefore doing more with less is our reality. We have faced these challenges and met them. The District had to make cuts that were not always popular, but the board ensured that programming for our students was not cut. We have faced challenges, but rather than letting those challenges define us, we have accepted the challenges and worked with them to make ourselves grow and improve. Our students are meeting the challenges of the classroom and in extra-curricular activities. The state report cards this year were released and JHE is exceeding expectations and the MS/HS met expectations. This is based on our high achieving students and the work that they do each day. Again, we have so much to be proud of. The pride within the Hustisford School District is deep, it is evident in the support that is received for students in many areas. The traditions within the District are valued as well. We are #HustyProud!

We have been having lots of fun learning in First Grade this year! We especially enjoy projects and theme days.

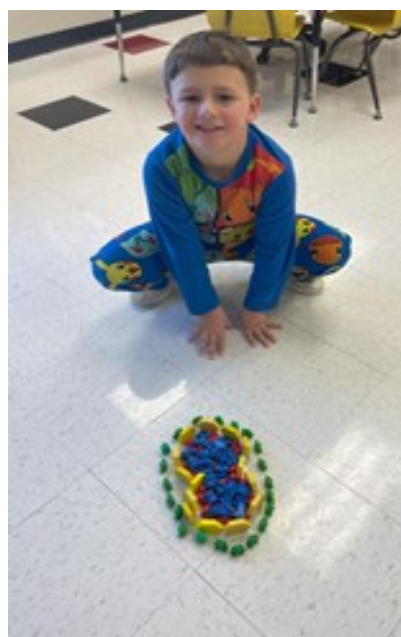

It is hard to believe that the first semester of school is over and that we celebrated the 100th Day of School. Our students at JHE have grown so much over the past 5 months. They have so much to be proud of. The pure joy that one witnesses when a child figures out a math problem or a challenging word in text is something that all staff members cherish. Those moments when a student who has struggled to grasp a concept and they suddenly figure it out are priceless. The joy that comes each and every day in an elementary school is something that is cherished. The students at JHE bring so much energy and joy to all. The second semester brings many of the same joys and new celebrations.

New 3K/4K/5K Open House is set for April 16, 2025 from 5:00-6:30 pm. This is an open house style format and you may come at any time during this time range. This is a time for families of new 3K and 4K students for Fall of 2025 can come in and meet the teacher, explore the classroom, and have questions answered in regards to programming. Information on Kid's Club wraparound care for 3K and 4K students will also be available for families. The 5K room will also be open for families of 5K students for the 2025-2026 school year. Summer Recreation and Swimming Lessons sign up will also take place during this time. Kids Club sign up can also be completed at registration. Summer school, session 1 runs from June 9-27. Session 2 runs from July 7-Aug. 1.

There are several upcoming dates that are important for JHE students and families. JHE will also be having their annual Glow Dance on March 14. This event was very successful last year. Grades 9 and 10 will be taking the PreACT Secure on April 16th and April 17th.

These tests are vital in evaluating student progress, determining curriculum needs, and helping students achieve future endeavors. These tests are also a portion of how the State evaluates their progress and produces our overall score on the State Report Card. Please encourage your child to take these tests to the best of their ability. With your encouragement we hope to capture an accurate assessment of your child's abilities and how we can improve to be the best school in the area.

I would just like to encourage everyone to attend Parent-Teacher Conferences, which are scheduled for Thursday, February 20th, from 4:00— 7:00 p.m. Please come meet or visit with your child's second semester teachers.

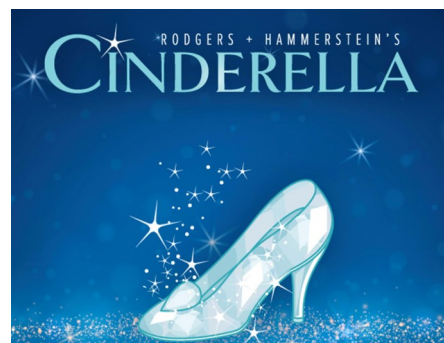
THE CAREER FAIR IS BACK!
