Hustisford Happenings

From the Desk of Mrs. Cramer, District Administrator

I am humbled and honored to serve the Hustisford School District as both the Superintendent of Schools and the elementary principal. I am blessed to work alongside other dedicated administrators that serve our students, staff, and constituents each day. Their leadership whether with students, operations, or special programming is appreciated and recognized. Our district has amazing teachers and support professionals that work with students and address needs daily. I take pride that we have built a team that works together and supports each other professionally and personally. We work, along with the board, to build a strong staff that can help move our district forward. We want only the best in front of our children. We have faced workforce challenges that require creativity and patience. Unfortunately, we have had to leave positions unfilled. The challenges are not only a lack of qualified individuals, but a demand that outweighs the supply which has forced wages to become more competitive and candidates to be more in control than ever before. We have faced these challenges with a commitment not to settle and a diligence to not cause undue hardship. We continue to work to find the best fit so that our students receive the high quality, diverse education that they deserve.

Our district has determination. We all have the same goal in mind, what is best for our kids. We strive to remain competitive in a highly competitive world. We strive to create a well-rounded and relevant curriculum so that all students can be competitive academically and in the workforce. We continue to strive to offer extracurriculars that our students want so that they have choices and options. We want our kids to move into the world as competitive or more so to those around them. With all of these things comes cost. We are feeling the stresses of the lack of funding for schools. This is not only a local issue, but a greater state issue. We did not receive any additional funding for schools in the past biennium budget. We were told that ESSER funding was enough. Our district used ESSER funding at its intent. We did not use it for ongoing expenses, rather we used it for a large project. We received a slight increase in this past biennium which certainly helps. But, we are woefully behind inflation.

Our district's property valuation saw an increase again this year which has helped us to lower our mill rate once again. This year we saw an increase of \$325 per pupil in state aid. This increase certainly helped us as the state budget had been stagnant for the previous biennium. Special education costs continue to skyrocket. Our district is reimbursed just shy of 33% of actual costs. This puts a strain on our budget. Federal reimbursements have fallen shy of actual costs to educate children. Unfunded mandates continue to be put into schools as well. Act 20 will provide guidance to schools on how literacy should be taught and will certainly be impactful to students and their achievement. The impact on our students is certainly going to be positive, but how we fund these mandates is a challenge. All of these things come with a cost. The district is looking for ways to offset these costs. Ultimately,

Chemistry for Credits

Beginning this year, students have the opportunity to earn college credit in Chemistry through Moraine Park Technical College's Dual Credit program. This course, taught completely during the regular school day at the high school by Hustisford's staff, allows students to earn 4 credits in Chemistry, equivalent to the first semester of Chemistry at a university or college. This transcripted class with MPTC can then be transferred to a number of public and private colleges and universities not only in Wisconsin, but throughout the Midwest and beyond.

This quarter, students have been learning the basics of chemistry including how matter works and separation techniques of matter. They have been able to complete labs such as the isolation of caffeine from tea as well as a number of virtual activities.






(continued from page 1) new curriculum will be adopted, and we are hoping for state assistance with that, but it is currently being held up in the courts. As things unfold, we will find ways to meet the challenges and make them work for Hustisford.

The district has prioritized and will continue to prioritize our buildings and operations. Our focus is on HVAC, safety and security, and a new roof. We continue to encounter HVAC issues and are working to keep both our heating and cooling systems up and running. We know that issues exist in both buildings. New boilers were installed at the MS/HS. This is certainly a step in the right direction. The boilers at JHE are functioning, but in need of some repair. The air conditioning in both buildings is out and the costs for fixing is high. There are other parts within the system that cause issues as well. The district is working closely with HSR to help build an outline of all of the concerns and attach costs to those concerns. Safety and security continue to be a concern in both buildings as well. Unfortunately, in the world we live in, safety has become our reality. The board is looking at options to make both buildings more secure without adding square footage. These options are more cost effective and provide safety and security that is need-ed. State statute limits what districts can and cannot do in regards to funding projects and what districts are allowed to borrow. The district is limited to a borrowing capacity of one million dollars without going to referendum. The board cannot simply raise taxes to help defray costs. That cannot be done without a referendum.

The financial limits of the district are being realized. We work to ensure that our students have all they need to be successful. We work to ensure that we are competitively paying our staff to keep the best in front of our children and to decrease turn-over rates. We work to ensure that we are maintaining the current equipment that we have. The board will continue to work through the challenges being faced with facilities and work with the community to determine the best route moving forward. This is our reality. We are facing a deficit budget to keep our buildings operating and our staff here to educate our students. Cuts are going to have to happen. In the past, when faced with these challenges, the district made cuts to staffing positions and to other expenses, sparing all programming for kids and in some cases increasing what we offer. We are at a crucial point of what cuts can be made and what can we do moving forward. This is not an easy task. It is a challenge that the board is taking on as well as the administrative team. Together we will work to provide all we can for students in the most fiscally responsible way we can.

This past year we had many successes. We do it right; we keep our students as our #1 focus. John Hustis Elementary was named in the top 50 elementary schools, #44 to be exact, in the State of Wisconsin. Our district continues to show growth on our district report cards. Our schools meet or exceed expectations. We cannot do this alone, our community support has been and continues to be amazing. The support our kids receive is like no other. We are so proud of what we have done and where we are going. With organizations such as the Hustisford Booster Club and PTC, we will continue to move our district forward. With community support from businesses, individuals, organizations, and families for projects and events, our kids continue to be put first. We cannot do it alone, those in the community that continue to show support and strive to make our schools better are appreciated and your generosity and dedication is noticed.

The District is moving forward, we face challenges with grit and determination. Our mission statement focuses on empowering all students to learn the skills, acquire the knowledge, and develop the attitudes necessary to reach their full potential as citizens who can meet the challenges of a global society. We will do just that! We are preparing our kids to perform for life. I ask for continued support from the community. Together, as a team, we can achieve more. I am so proud of all we have done and all we have yet to accomplish.

KINDERGARTEN CHRONICLES

Kindergarten is off to a great start. We are working on being respectful, responsible and safe each and every day. In October we took a field trip to Ebert's Greenhouse in Ixonia along with 4k. We had a beautiful day to hear a story, make a craft, go on a hayride to choose a pumpkin, and play in the play area. We also loved having the firefighters come to visit. We learned about their uniforms, tried them on, and checked out the fire truck. We loved seeing the different tools we had read about in class.

We have a buddy classroom. Third grade is our buddy class and we love to do activities with them. We have learned about each other, made a fire truck snack together and played games with them. We love seeing them in the hallway and saying hi when we meet. We also have a classroom stuffed pet, Lewie, the Lion. He came to us from a Holland America Cruise Ship that sailed around Africa. Each night one child takes the animal home, writes what they do together, takes a picture and returns him the next day. Everyone is anxiously awaiting their turn! After each child gets a turn, Lewie will then spend the weekend with each family.

In phonics we have learned twenty six sounds of the alphabet. We learned the uppercase and lowercase letter formation along with their sounds. We have been working on our handwriting of these letters. In our small group time we are working on reviewing our sound knowledge and letter formation. Now we are working on word families. We realize these words rhyme and we are creating charts of these word families and practicing writing the words. Our sounds are very important for reading and writing. In writing we learned how to draw many different characters and scenes. We are learning about parts of a sentence including words, spaces, and a period.

In math we have focused on the numbers 1-10. We know how to write them and 1:1 count objects to 10. We are working on joining numbers together with dice games and story problems Mrs. Haan orally tells us. We are working on counting to 40. We have learned the 5 two dimensional shapes. Every 10 days of school we receive a note from Zero the Hero. He leaves us a treat hidden in our classroom. The treat is something in the shape of a zero. On November 12th we will have a special celebration for the 50th day of school!

In reading we are looking at books for fifteen minutes independently. We also read with a partner or listen to stories on our iPads every day for fifteen minutes. We love to listen to nonfiction and fiction stories. We are working on vocabulary words for each topic we discuss.

We have been practicing sight words (snap words as we call them, our goal is to read them in a snap). In small groups we are working on sound knowledge and writing sounds. Next we will work on reading and writing cvc words. Using our second step guidance lessons we have worked on our rules for learning. We need to listen, focus our attention, follow directions, use selftalk, and be assertive. Next we will focus on feelings and empathy. Ms. Gaetz, our school counselor, has come in once a week to reinforce our skills for learning. We have worked on identifying emotions with her. Ms. Gaetz also has worked with on telling vs tattling and being a kind friend.

In social studies we talked about learning and working together. We have just begun to learn about jobs and why people have a job. We talked about jobs at school and in the community. As students we have a job to learn. Next we will talk about work now and long ago. In science we have experimented with sinking and floating, along with reactions that vinegar and baking soda will cause. We love to watch Mystery Science lessons and have learned all about weather. We learned about storms and severe weather, how to practice describing various characteristics of weather as well as weather during the different seasons Next, we will learn about the needs of animals.

It has been an amazing first quarter at John Hustis Elementary School. The students have been working hard and learning so much. Our staff has been working hard to ensure that the students have exactly what they need to be successful. Students have been working on living the Falcon Way. The Falcon Way is our school-wide behavior initiative. The program has established school wide behavioral expectations for students throughout all of the areas of the school. Students earn tickets when they demonstrate expected behaviors. Tickets are then placed in a bucket in the office. Throughout the week tickets are picked and students report to the office for a small reward. At the end of the month an assembly is held. At the assembly various awards are given out to students. Students earn "Golden Awards", given by art, music, physical education, custodial staff, our SRO, library, the office, and the lunchroom. Students also have a chance to get their tickets picked at the monthly meeting to win a prize for their entire class. Students have won fun parties for their classmates and fun days for their classmates to participate in. The Falcon Way is an amazing way to bring kids together and to help them learn and understand expected school behaviors.

The Winter Concert is scheduled for December 17 at 6:00 pm at the HS. The concert will feature students from 3K-5th grade. It will also feature the students who participate in choir and also the 5th grade band students. We are excited for the concert and the opportunity for our students to showcase their talents.

There are many wonderful things that are happening at JHE each day. Students receive additional services in reading and math if needed. Students also have the opportunity to meet with our school guidance team. Students receive extra support for behavioral challenges when needed as well. Students can also take home a snack pack on the weekend to help provide them with snacks and easy to make meals. We continue to work to provide more for our students to help them be successful.

Kids Club is off to a great start. Currently after school care for 3K and 4K is offered as well as after school care for all students in grades K-5. Kids Club operates daily when school is in session. The program offers high quality after school care in a fun learning environment. Students receive a healthy snack, fun after school activities, great craft projects, weekly themes for learning and sharing, and homework support if needed. The students are cared for by a certified childcare provider, teaching staff, and high school aged students. Families can sign up for Kids Club at any time.

Winter chills have arrived. Students at JHE play outside daily and need to be dressed appropriately for the weather. The only time indoor recess occurs is if it is below zero or it is raining or storming. It is important that kids dress accordingly in order to be safe and happy on the playground.

The second annual craft and vendor fair fundraiser for JHE is on December 14 from 9-2 at the high school. Last year this event was amazing. We are still looking for vendors. 
Ms. Daley's 7th Grade Happenings

The 7 th grade class members were working on unit rates and conversions for the first chapter of the year. Students first had to practice converting in the metric system and in the customary system.

They soon realized they love the metric system better since all they had to do is move the decimal to convert between units! The customary system was a bit more challenging knowing all of the conversions for length, weight and capacity.

After practicing our conversions, we then moved on to convert units. For example, we could turn gallons per minute to cups per hour. We had an activity where we went outside and measured in feet per second how long it took us to walk backwards, hop on one foot, skip, and walk. When we were finished we converted each of these to miles per hour.

Students enjoyed the activity and it was a great way to show how math can be used in a real situation.

As always, it is our goal as a physical education department to expose our students to new activities that encourage physical activity and fitness in a fun and exciting way!

At its core, physical activity is essential for children's development, impacting their physical health, mental wellbeing, and social skills. Regular exercise helps to build strong bones and muscles, maintain a healthy weight, and reduce the risk of chronic diseases. Beyond physical benefits, active children often experience improved mood, reduced anxiety, and better concentration, which can enhance academic performance. Encouraging a lifestyle that includes regular physical activity sets the foundation for healthy habits that can last a lifetime. SCHOOL COUNSELOR'S CORNER

Attention parents/guardians of seniors!

Financial aid season is quickly approaching! As acceptance letters begin to arrive, the question of how this educational opportunity is going to be paid for is often at the forefront of people's minds. One of the ways this can be achieved is by filling out the Free Application for Federal Student Aid or FAFSA. The FAFSA gives students access to the largest source of financial aid to pay for college or vocational school. Through completing the FAFSA, students can be considered for federal financial aid, including Pell grants, work study programs, and loans. In addition, many states and colleges, as well as some private financial aid providers, use FAFSA information to determine students' eligibility for merit aid.

This year, the FAFSA will be open on December 1st, 2024. Students planning on attending a postsecondary institution in the fall of 2025 or spring of 2026 will want to complete this application on studentaid.gov before they begin attending. Deadlines for the FAFSA can be confusing, but I recommend students to look to their school of choice for their preferred timeline. First time applicant or just feeling completely overwhelmed by the process? Attend our annual financial aid night at Mayville High School on Monday, November 18th at 6:30pm. A college financial aid expert will give an overview of the FAFSA process and be available to answer questions. Another great resource for financial aid help is College Goal Wisconsin. This program offers in-person and virtual workshops where students have the chance to win scholarship money simply by attending. A full list of their events and more information can be found at collegegoalwi.org.

Seniors will also want to pay attention to our Senior Class Counseling Google Classroom page as more scholarships opportunities become available. Scholarships from outside organizations are being posted as they come in and links to national scholarship databases can be found as well. Information about our local scholarship program will be posted to the page in the spring. My tip for seniors is to utilize our letter of recommendation request form sooner rather than later to help get one task crossed off their list. Our local scholarship program requires two letters of recommendation and I know the teachers, coaches, and other influential people in their lives will appreciate having the opportunity to take their time to write your student a really great letter.

Hustisford School District Speech Sound Development



November 2024

Do you often wonder what your kids are trying say? Do friends or family get confused trying to understand your kids? It is normal for kids to mispronounce the sounds in words as they develop their communication, but when should we expect kids to acquire all of their speech sounds?

Speech sounds are the fundamental building blocks of language and communication. A child needs learn that sound conveys meaning, and that meaning can change when sounds are used in different combinations. By age 5, children should have acquired most of their speech sounds and be able to be understood by both familiar and unfamiliar listeners. A child typically acquires speech sounds in predictable stages. At a certain point, your child should be able to clearly communicate their needs and wants. The treehouse to the right shows the typical age that kids acquire certain sounds. Take a look and see what sounds your kids have acquired!

Why Does It Matter?

A child who does not acquire speech sounds by age 5 (kindergarten) is at high risk of stunting their literacy and language development, which results in lower academic performance and impacts their socialization and self-esteem.



How You Can Help!

(McLeod and Crowe, 2018)

It is essential to provide a figurative ladder for your child to climb up the tree of language. A child needs exposure to speech and language in order to acquire their own speech and language. Speech and language exposure is faciliated through the following methods.

- Experiences:
 - Take your child to places, events, social gatherings, listen/sing to music, and provide them with experiences that will expose them to sound, language, and vocabulary that will leave an impression on them.
- Modeling language "talking to your child":
 - a Talk through your actions and comment on what you see as you go about your day. You will bombard your child with speech and language which they will experience and absorb through consistent effort.
- · Reading to your child:
 - Read a short book with your child each evening. Point out the characters, use your finger to point and following along to the text. Let your child ask questions and engage their curiosity.

When To Raise Questions

Reach out to a teacher or school staff member if your child is difficult to understand by many listeners, your child does not acquire speech sounds by their approximate developmental age, and if your child is demonstrating decreased academic performance.
